Saturday, June 25th: Arrival at Rome Airport and transfer to Tuscany

Arrival in Rome and transfer to Tuscany. Welcome dinner at local restaurant.

Saturday June 25th to Wednesday June 29th: 4 nights at *Hotel Dei Capitani*. Situated in part of the eighteenth-century "Catasto Leopoldino" in the historic centre of Montalcino and overlooking the countryside, Hotel Dei Capitani offers relaxed Tuscan hospitality. With splendid views, taking in the Val d'Orcia and the Val d'Arbia, enjoy the ambiance with breakfast on the terrace or a dip in the pool.

Sunday, June 26th: Morning CE Lecture, Wine Tasting Brunch, and Montalcino Walking Tour

Breakfast at the Hotel followed by CE Lecture (3 hours)

Time for our first foray into Tuscan wine at a local vineyard for a tasting brunch. Afterward a walk through the medieval town on Montalcino.

Dinner on own

Montalcino, made rich and famous by its **Brunello** wine, one of the world's best and most appreciated Italian wines, is a classic fairytale hilltop town surrounded by rolling sunny hills dotted with yellow and red flowers, ancient oak trees, picturesque olive groves, scenic country roads winding through perfect vineyards and isolated cypress trees atop hills all set within a full circle of fortified walls and watched over by a mighty castle of medieval perfection.



Monday, June 27th: Cooking Class and Montepulciano

Breakfast at the hotel and morning at leisure

Lunch today is of your own creation as we make our way to a Brunello winery for a hands-on cooking class and wine pairing.

Time to walk off lunch with a tour of the medieval town of **Montepulciano**, full of elegant Renaissance palaces, ancient churches, charming squares and hidden corners with vast panoramas all over the wonderful Val d'Orcia and Val di Chiana valleys that surround it.

Transfer back to the hotel for time at leisure and dinner on your own or linger in the city for dinner and return to the hotel later in the evening.

Tuesday, June 28th: Morning CE Lecture and Pienza

Breakfast at the hotel followed by CE Lecture (3 hours)

Afterward, we head to the charming village of **Pienza**, city of *cacio*, which means cheese!, for a walking tour and tasting of the famous local **Pecorino of Pienza**.

Transfer back to the hotel for time at leisure and dinner on your own or linger in the city for dinner and return to the hotel later in the evening.

Wednesday, June 29th: Transfer to Radda and Wine Tasting Dinner

Breakfast at the hotel and check-out

We make the transition from one region to the next, ending in the quaint medieval hilltop village of **Radda**. Located in the Chianti Region, there is at least 1,000 years of winemaking heritage in the hills around Radda.

Wednesday, June 29th to Friday, July 1st: 2 nights at Palazzo Leopoldo. Located inside a former 11th century noble palace, *Palazzo Leopoldo* has been carefully restored, keeping the flavour of the ancient lords of Tuscany with original pieces of the residence, including frescoes, fireplaces, exposed beams and antique furniture. Amenities are modern and exhaustive, and include a wellness center, indoor pool, gym, wine bar, a solarium with Jacuzzi and a beautiful terrace from which to admire the rolling hills of Chianti. 4*



Thursday, June 30th: Siena and Afternoon CE Lecture

Breakfast at the hotel

Transfer to Siena for a walking tour and free time. Return to hotel for afternoon CE Lecture (3 hours).

Dinner this evening at a local restaurant

Siena is a city where the architecture soars, as do the souls of many of its visitors. Effectively a giant, open-air museum celebrating the Gothic, Siena has spiritual and secular monuments that have retained both their medieval forms and their extraordinary art collections, providing the visitor with plenty to marvel at. The city's historic *contrade* (districts) are marvellous too, being as close-knit and colourful today as they were in the 17th century, when their world-famous horse race, the Palio, was inaugurated. And within each *contrada* lies vibrant streets populated with artisanal boutiques, sweet-smelling *pasticceria* (pastry shops) and tempting restaurants. It's a feast for the senses and an essential stop on every Tuscan itinerary. (*Lonely Planet*)

Friday, July 1st: Transfer to Florence, Afternoon Accademia Gallery Visit

We make our way to the capital of Tuscany, **Florence**.

Time for lunch at leisure before an afternoon walking tour and visit to the Accademia Gallery to see Michelangelo's magnificent statue of David.

Unsurprisingly, the entire city centre is a Unesco World Heritage Site. Italy's fashion industry was born and bred in Florence. Homegrown designers Guccio Gucci and Salvatore Ferragamo opened haute-couture boutiques in Florence in the 1920s and shopping in the Tuscan capital has been stylish ever since. Florence is for walking so get out and enjoy.

“Live, Laugh and Learn: A Tuscan tour of oral pathology”

Spend a week with the distinguished oral pathologist, Dr. John R. Kalmar, and ease your mind about the detection, diagnosis and management of oral lesions encountered in daily practice. You will review the elements of a comprehensive oral, head and neck patient examination and the importance of recording exam findings. Dr. Kalmar will help you recognize the signs and symptoms of common as well as significant oral diseases. Special emphasis will be given to: 1) oral vesiculo-erosive conditions, 2) infectious diseases, 3) radiographic abnormalities, 4) oral cancer and pre-cancerous lesions, and 5) common and potentially malignant skin lesions. Clinical cases and an interactive format will help reinforce the differential diagnostic process as you review the current understanding of disease development and treatment options.

Learning Objectives:

- 1) To be able to describe the conventional oral, head and neck examination, including both visual and tactile components; list the physical characteristics of oral lesions that inform the patient record; and describe a follow-up protocol for oral lesions.
- 2) To understand vesiculo-erosive conditions that may present as desquamative gingivitis and describe their diagnosis and management.
- 3) To be able to describe the features of common infectious conditions of the oral cavity, including bacterial, fungal and viral diseases.
- 4) To understand common and significant cutaneous lesions and conditions of the head and neck region.
- 5) To understand the etiology and clinical features of oral precancerous and cancerous conditions and their distinction from tonsillar or oropharyngeal cancer.
- 6) To understand common and significant bony lesions of the oral and maxillofacial region, including their associated radiographic features.

John R. Kalmar, D.M.D., Ph.D., is Clinical Professor and Director, Division of Oral and Maxillofacial Pathology and Radiology, The Ohio State University College of Dentistry. Dr. Kalmar received his BS from the University of Illinois and his D.M.D. from Southern Illinois University in 1979 followed by residencies in hospital dentistry at the University of North Carolina–Chapel Hill, and in oral pathology at Emory University. He also earned a Ph.D. in Experimental Pathology from Emory in

1989. Dr. Kalmar has published over 75 manuscripts, book chapters and invited editorials. He teaches at both the pre-and post-doctoral levels and provides continuing education to a variety of professional audiences. Dr. Kalmar is a Diplomate of the American Board of Oral and Maxillofacial Pathology and a member of the Editorial Board of Oral Surgery, Oral Medicine, Oral Pathology and Oral Radiology (OOOO). He is a Consultant for the ADA Council of Scientific Affairs and has served on expert panels to evaluate adjunctive devices for detecting oral cancer and precancerous lesions as well as medication related osteonecrosis of the jaws. He is a Past-President of the American Academy of Oral and Maxillofacial Pathology and is currently a Director on the American Board of Oral and Maxillofacial Pathology.
